In early 2011, I met Gillian Howell, an artist from Australia in the English language course in Esperansa Community Centre in Lospalos, Timor-Leste. Gillian led a community music project in my town, working with a number of young people from Australia who were very talented in music. One of them that I now know well is flute player Lina Andonovska. They asked me to look for a group of young people who might enjoy playing music from local traditional instruments. I invited them to my home village Kakavei where we introduced music that is

A year later Dr Kim invited me to work with her in an NGO she and her colleague Holly Schauble founded in Lospalos. I accepted this opportunity to work for Many Hands International because of the friendship that we had already and because I had enjoyed meeting other Australians. I started working for Many Hands three days a week as a translator in February 2012. My duties included translating documents and data collected by our research team documenting the endangered cultural heritage of the Fataluku people. I enjoyed the work as a translator because I wanted to learn English. Through this work I began to develop my English language skills.

In early 2013, Australian volunteer Lucia Pichler came to join us on the research project. Over several months working with Lucia, I increasingly felt that the working environment was very pleasant, and I also learned about how to complete a job independently without having to continuously ask for instructions. We also saw how Lucia set an example of working professionally with high standards. She also advanced a creative work culture which she demonstrated through her work every day.

In November 2013, I met with Professor John Toumbourou, who I later discovered was a Chair in the School of Psychology at Deakin University in Australia. He visited Lospalos because his wife Dr. Kim Dunphy was dedicating her time and knowledge researching the

endangered cultural heritage of Fataluku in Lospalos. In a short conversation with Professor John, I tell him about social problems faced by the people in our community. I told him about the high rate of tobacco use among young people in Lospalos, (later I discovered that Timor Leste has the highest tobacco users in the world). He listened attentively. At the end of our meeting Professor John asked me what my career goals were.

Early in 2014, I was appointed to a new position at Many Hands as a Health Promotion Officer, my career dream. My task was to develop a strategy to overcome tobacco use among young people in my home town. This project was initiated by Professor John Toumbourou. The first phase of the project was training. Professor John, through the School of Psychology provide a financial support for my training for three months in Australia. The training included academic English and basic research techniques. In June 2014, I returned to Lospalos and initiated a consultation with government officials in the District Lautem to determine strategies to overcome high tobacco use among young people. Initially I felt this project may not be implemented because of my limitations. Again Lucia Pichler was an outstanding motivator. Lucia continued to give support to me that enabled the project to eventually be successful.



At first, this program was only implemented in Lautem, but with Lucia supervision and dedication in sharing her skills with me, I successfully established a civil society organisation, the National Alliance for Tobacco Control. This consists of many NGOs who want to work together to achieve a Timor-Leste that is free from tobacco smoke. I was very proud and pleased to represent Timor-Leste at a WHO meeting on non-communicable diseases in India in July 2015.
